



SPEAKERS

Andres Avila Fire Chief, Anderson Valley Fire Department



Andres Avila has been the AV Fire Chief since 2013. He moved to Anderson Valley in 2003 to manage a 740-acre ranch in the Yorkville area and immediately started volunteering for the AV Fire Department. Since then, he and his family continue to manage the same ranch and an additional ranch nearby. Maintaining two small cattle herds and the ranch, he stays busy when not at work at the fire department. Living and working on a rural ranch, serving as an emergency responder, continued involvement in fire prevention, and a deep interest in land stewardship, he has found himself in a unique position to connect the fire suppression world with the realities of rural living. This desire has recently driven him to receive the California Prescribed-Fire Burn Boss Certification in an attempt to bring safe and low intensity fire back into Anderson Valley's rural landscape and experience good fire without the anxiety of recent years.

Tim Bates Owner / Manager, Apple Farm	Tim is a farmer. He moved to Anderson Valley in 1984 to a 80-year old apple orchard and has been tending, growing, and marketing over 80 varieties of organic apples and pears ever since. The Apple Farm is roughly 35 acres in size with 15 acres in fruit production and an acre of gardens and berries. A portion of the Apple Farm property is a dynamic riparian area along the Navarro River in a constant flux from flooding. The farm stand stocks fresh fruit, fresh cider during apple season, hard cider, vinegars, jams, jellies, and chutneys. As a destination, there are guest cottages to stay in to savor a truly pastoral experience.
Brock Dolman Senior Biologist at Occidental Arts and Ecology Center	Brock Dolman co-directs the WATER Institute, Permaculture Design Program and Wildlands Program. He has taught Permaculture and consulted on regenerative project design and implementation internationally in Costa Rica, Ecuador, U.S. Virgin Islands, Spain, Brazil, China, Canada, Zimbabwe, Tanzania, Democratic Republic of Congo, Cuba and widely in the U.S. He has been the keynote presenter at numerous conferences and was featured in the award- winning films <i>The 11th Hour</i> by Leonardo DiCaprio, <i>The Call of Life</i> by Species Alliance, and <i>Permaculture: A</i> <i>Quiet Revolution</i> by Vanessa Shultz. In October of 2012, he gave a City 2.0 TEDx talk. Brock completed his BA in the Biology and Environmental Studies departments at the University of California Santa Cruz in 1992, graduating with honors. For over a decade, he has served as an appointed commissioner on the Sonoma County Fish & Wildlife Commission.
Kyle Farmer Soil Tender, Magruder Ranch	Kyle Farmer is a patient, curious land manager who applies disturbance ecology theory to real-world problems. He has been responsible for the application of a large variety of tools - from the managed grazing of cattle, sheep and goats to the targeted use of masticators and chainsaws. Among these many tools, fire is his favorite. He sits on the board of the Mendocino County Farm Bureau and is one of the founding members of the Mendocino Prescribed Burn Association. Recently, he

	has turned a portion of his attention from implementation to education as a Community Education Specialist with the University of California Cooperative Extension.
Barbara Goodell AVLT Board of Directors	Barbara was very fortunate to spend her early years in relatively wild places in Northern California with outdoor-loving parents going camping, hiking, boating while exploring beaches, rivers, and mountains, observing how implicitly essential biodiversity is to all creatures. The importance of that experience became even more clear, when, after graduating from college, she ventured to the East coast to Washington, D.C for an eye- opening year of conference work at The Brookings Institution with researchers who staged conferences to inform top federal government employees about the needs of large corporations as well as to acquaint CEOs with the inside workings of the federal government. That effort continues to this day. She also was on AV CSD Board and taught in the local schools and community college. Nancy Hornor AVLT Board of Directors	Nancy retired from the National Park Service in 2015 as the planning manager at Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA), leaving a career in planning and environmental review dedicated to helping shape the GGNRA as a new national park. Her work involved planning and community involvement in a wide range of projects, from master plans to site plans, restoration, transportation and trails. Nancy joined the Anderson Valley Land Trust Board in 2016. She and her husband John spend their time between San Francisco and Anderson Valley, where they have had a small organic garden and orchard since 1989.

Mike Jones, Ph.D UCCE Forest Advisor for Sonoma, Mendocino, and Lake Counties.	Mike completed a Ph.D. in Entomology from State University of New York, College of Environmental Science and Forestry and a B.S. in Environmental Biology and Management from UC Davis. Prior to joining UCCE, He was a Research Project Assistant (graduate student) at State University of New York and a research associate in the Department of Entomology, UC Davis in collaboration with the US Forest Service, Forest Health Protection in southern California. Mike has conducted research on multiple native and invasive forest pests, including goldspotted oak borer and emerald ash borer. His experiences in forest health, disturbance ecology, forest ecology, and management have given me the skills to be of service to landowners and managers who want to implement good forest stewardship practices that help create healthy and sustainable forests that are resilient to disturbances such as insects, diseases, fire, and climate chance.
Obi Kaufmann	Obi Kaufmann is an American naturalist, writer, and illustrator. He is the author of <i>The</i> <i>California Field Atlas</i> , a guide to the state's ecology and geography. The book features hundreds of his watercolor paintings of maps, wildlife, and other aspects of nature. He studied at the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB). He entered as a biology major but switched to visual arts after finding inspiration in wildlife painting and the rock art of the Chumash people. While at UCSB, he took art classes under the painter Ciel Bergman.
Yorkio Kishimoto, President, AVLT Board of Directors	Yoriko's appreciation of nature began in her childhood, hiking in the mountains with her dad and an aunt who knew all the plants. She served on the Palo Alto City Council for eight years including a term as the city's Mayor. She is also a board member of the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District, which has founded extensive public preserves and trails in the Bay Area. Recently she became a Councilor for Save the Redwoods League. Yoriko is also an accomplished painter. Yoriko and her husband Lee have two adult daughters and live in Anderson Valley because of its natural beauty and active community.

Norman Kobler Vineyard Manager	Norman grew up working with vines and wines. His parents, Hans and Theresia Kobler came from Switzerland in the 1950s. After working at premier restaurants in Canada, L.A., and San Francisco, they settled in the Anderson Valley and founded Lazy Creek Vineyard. His parents relied on Norman to manage the vines, although he helped in the cellar as well. Aside from a year in Malans, Switzerland working on an exchange program at Liesch Family Wines, Norman has exclusively worked in the Anderson Valley wine region for the last 47 years since he was seven. He has been overseeing at Ferrington Vineyards since 1997 and raised his children there along with his wife, Colleen. It is Norman's belief that the Pinot and Gewürztraminer from the Anderson Valley can hold their own anywhere. In 2017, Norman was awarded Vineyard Manager of the Year from the North Bay Business Journal. Norman and Colleen started Philo Vineyard Solutions in 2019. In addition to farming, Norman also has been a commercial fisherman since 1992.
Ronald W. Lincoln, Sr. Round Valley Pomo	Ron is of Pomo, Wylackii, and Concow descent and a registered member of the Round Valley Indian Reservation. He has several decades of experience in tribal governance and administration. He is the culture bearer for his tribe, does outreach, and travels throughout Mendocino, Sonoma, and Napa counties as an advisor and consultant.
Linda MacElwee Project Coordinator Navarro River Resource Center / Mendocino County Resource Conservation District	Linda has worked for MCRCD since 2005, first serving as the part-time Navarro Education and Outreach Coordinator, and since 2011, full-time as the Navarro Watershed Coordinator. Linda specializes in California native plants and has designed and implemented numerous riparian re-vegetation projects. She is a graduate of the University of Arizona, and brings with her 25 years of experience in organic gardening and permaculture. Linda received training in USDA NRCS Conservation Planning and is currently enrolled in a three year Certified Educators program in Holistic Management. In line with her interest in assisting farmers and ranchers, she helped develop the Mendocino County Local Food Guide and is working with RCD partners to bring LandSmart [™] conservation planning program to Mendocino County

Mary Mayeda Forest Program Manager MCRCD	Mary Mayeda is the North Coast Team Forester for the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). As a Registered Professional Forester, Mary provides forestry and natural resources technical assistance to private non-industrial forestland owners and plans non-commercial conservation treatments for clients through NRCS' cost-share incentives program. In the past she has planned and implemented timber sales with the Forest Service and managed large-scale vegetation management grants. Her work focuses on forest stand resiliency and innovative management solutions including, fuel reduction, post-fire reforestation, oak woodland and aspen habitat enhancement, biomass energy production, and climate resiliency.

For twenty-seven years I've tended the sedge beds along the banks of the Russian River of my great aunt, a place where there are the most beautiful, the longest roots (up to eight feet!) Monty Schmitt Senior Project Director, The Nature Conservancy	Monty Schmitt leads the Healthy Rivers Program to restore the health of California rivers and salmon populations while increasing water supply reliability for communities. Monty has nearly three decades of experience in California working collaboratively with water districts, farmers, state and federal agencies and conservation groups on water resource management issues. With the Nature Conservancy, Monty oversees the development and implementation of strategies to restore the health of rivers and improve water supply reliability for communities in Northern California. Previously, Monty worked for the NRDC as a senior scientist and led the organization's efforts to restore flows and salmon to California's second largest river, the San Joaquin. Monty Schmitt is also currently an elected director serving on the Marin Municipal Water District Board.

Emilie Winfield Regional Coordinator, North Coast Soil Hub	Emilie works to increase understanding of how to manage agro-ecosystems for soil health and increase adoption of practices that support soil health. Emilie works with local resource conservation districts, agricultural producers and other regional partners to provide education opportunities for learning about soil health and carbon farming, share stories from the field, and bring in resources to support planning and implementation of climate-friendly practices. Prior to joining PCI last year, he was a Professor in the Geography and Earth Science Department at Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania for 28 years, where he taught courses in hydrology, water resources management, geology, and soils. For the past several years his research has focused on water quality and stream flow augmentation strategies in the Navarro River watershed and he's excited to have relocated in Sonoma County to continue this work.
